

John Maune is professor in the Junior College English department at Hokusei Gakuen University, Sapporo, Japan. He combined a chemistry major and literature minor during his undergraduate studies after which in 1991 he received his Ph.D. in biochemistry from Rice University, Houston, Texas, USA, publishing numerous biochemistry and genetic engineering research papers. He then took a year off and traveled throughout North America accompanied by the complete works of Shakespeare. In 1992 he moved to Sapporo, Japan, and from 1994 he started to teach a content-based EFL course, Life Science, at Hokusei. He has used Shakespeare's drama to teach various biological concepts in Life Science that highlight universals in human nature and illustrate the influence of evolution on our, as well as other species', behavior. He now is also the head of the department's study abroad program, and is interested in mind, brain and education findings and how they can be used to impact the classroom. Following his exit from laboratory research, he has published and spoken on many diverse topics: The Carnavalesque in *Coriolanus*, natural concepts in *Romeo and Juliet*, international education, and motivation, to name a few. Recently, he spoke at NeMLA 2016 in March, the FAB neuroELT Brain Days International Conference in September, 2015, and ESRA 2015 in July.
