

Hamid Sajadi is PhD student in Political Sociology at the University of Tehran, Iran. He teaches political science courses at the University of Esfahan. He is an expert of development theories and the schools of development, First to Fifth Development Plans of Iran, the perspective of development, criticisms and problems of Iran's development plans, and sociology of Iran. He is the Executive Director of the Association for Defending Victims of Terrorism and the Visiting Research Fellow at the Institute for Middle East Strategic Studies of Iran. Hamid Sajadi is the editor-in-chief of the journal, *Voices of Terrorism Victims*. He has done extensive research on the issues related to violence, development, political sociology, countering terrorism, and cults. He has also designed programs for confining and controlling the impacts of terrorism on society. Dr. Sajadi has carried out in-depth interviews with families of terror victims and with ex-members of terrorist cults, examining the impacts and consequences of terrorist acts. He has collaborated with associations, experts, international organizations, and UN Special Rapporteurs. Mr. Sajadi has designed several projects for strengthening the status of victims of terrorism and has analyzed the relation between media and terrorism.

He has written numerous papers including: Examining the principles of discontinuity in religious intellectualism (2009), Criticizing and examining the ideas and thoughts of liberalism (2010), Assessing the ideas of Michel Foucault on archaeology and genealogy (2011), Exploring the ideas and thoughts of religious democracy (2013), Conceptualizing in the religious intellectualism streams (2013) and Deconstructing the meta-narratives of political development (2011).
