Dr. Lydia Aletraris is the Assistant Director at the Center for Research on Behavioral Health and Human Services Delivery at the University of Georgia. Her main interests are in organizational and occupational sociology, and health services research. She has worked on research grants funded by the National Institutes of Health that focus on the adoption and diffusion of evidence-based practices in substance abuse treatment programs. Dr. Aletraris has examined the use of medication-assisted treatment, psychosocial approaches, and alternative approaches, such as music therapy, for the treatment of substance use disorders (SUDs); the use of HIV services in treatment programs; and how U.S. federal health policy, such as the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, impacts treatment programs. Her work has been cited in written testimony and statements made by the U.S. Government Accountability Office and the Office of National Drug Control Policy in the Executive Office of the President to the following audiences: the U.S. Senate, U.S. House, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, and the U.S. Department of Justice. Recently, she has focused attention on the impact of state-level recreational and medical marijuana legalization on treatment for SUDs. Her earlier research interests included work-life issues and the changing nature of work. She has examined how and why temporary agency workers differ from other workers in terms of job satisfaction, and how the prevalence of nonstandard workers in organizations impacts relations between employees and management. In other work, she has researched work-life conflict and its influence on individuals' actual and preferred hours, as well as how these hour mismatches are created and resolved over time. Dr. Aletraris has co-authored publications in the following peer-reviewed journals: American Sociological Review, Work & Occupations, Journal of Family Issues, Research in the Sociology of Work, Human Relations, Drug and Alcohol Dependence, Journal of Substance Abuse Treatment, Journal of Studies on Alcohol and Drugs, International Journal of Drug Policy, Substance Abuse, Journal of Psychoactive Drugs, The American Journal of Drug and Alcohol Abuse, and the Journal of Addictions Nursing.
