

Dr. Lydia Aletraris is an Adjunct Assistant Professor in the Department of Sociology, and the Assistant Director at the Center for Research on Behavioral Health and Human Services Delivery at the University of Georgia. She received a PhD in Sociology from the University of Georgia in 2010. She also holds a Bachelor of Science in Psychology from the Illinois Institute of Technology. Her main interests are in organizational and occupational sociology, and health services research. She has worked on grants funded by the National Institutes of Health that focus on the adoption of evidence-based practices in substance abuse treatment programs. Dr. Aletraris has examined the use of medication-assisted treatment, psychosocial approaches, and alternative approaches, such as music therapy, for the treatment of substance use disorder (SUD), the use of HIV services in treatment programs, and how federal health policy changes impact treatment. Recently, she has focused attention on the impact of recreational marijuana legalization on treatment for SUDs. Her earlier research interests included work-life issues and the changing nature of work. She has examined how and why temporary agency workers differ from other workers in terms of job satisfaction, and how the prevalence of nonstandard workers in organizations impacts relations between employees and management. In other work, she has researched work-life conflict and its influence on individuals' actual and preferred hours, as well as how these hour mismatches are created and resolved over time. Dr. Aletraris has co-authored publications in the following peer-reviewed journals: *American Sociological Review*, *Work & Occupations*, *Journal of Family Issues*, *Research in the Sociology of Work*, *Human Relations*, *Drug and Alcohol Dependence*, *Journal of Substance Abuse Treatment*, *Journal of Studies on Alcohol and Drugs*, *Substance Abuse*, *The American Journal of Drug and Alcohol Abuse*, and *Journal of Addictions Nursing*.
