Simone Selva holds a PhD in Contemporary European History from the University of Milan and a postdoctoral fellowship from the University of Bologna. A former associate fellow at Oxford University and at the Zentrum für Zeithistorische Forschung in Potsdam (Germany), he was visiting scholar at Columbia and Harvard Universities. More recently he was research fellow at the German Historical Institute in Washington DC and visiting research professor for the Mexican Government at El Colegio de Mexico. He is currently research fellow in the history of international economic relations at L'Orientale University of Naples. His research interests revolve around the interplay between the process of international financial and monetary interdependence from Bretton Woods through the 1970s, and the twofold development of mass consumption markets and energy policies in the international relations system from the standpoint of U.S. foreign economic policy. He has also researched the history of financial crises and international monetary relations from the XIX century through to the late XX century. He has been awarded the Italian National qualifications as Associate Professor in the History of International Relations (14/B2), and Economic History (13/C1).

He is the author of *Integrazione internazionale e sviluppo interno. Stati Uniti e Italia nei programmi di riarmo del blocco atlantico 1945-1955* (Rome: Carocci 2009), and *Supra-National Integration and Domestic Economic Growth. The United States and Italy in the Western Bloc Rearmament Programs, 1945-1955* (Bruxelles-New York-Oxford-Frankfurt: Peter Lang 2012).

He is currently working on a monograph on the U.S. foreign financial and monetary policies amid the two energy crises of the 1970s (*Before the Neoliberal Turn. The Rise of Energy Finance and the Limits to U.S. Foreign Economic Policy in the Long 1970s*, under preparation, London: Palgrave 2017 (Palgrave Studies in Economic History Series).
