

Dr Eleni Tracada is Senior Lecturer in the Built Environment (Architecture) at the University of Derby, UK; Chartered Member RIBA Part III; Senior Fellow of HEA. She graduated in architecture, Faculty of Architecture of Florence, Italy (1980) and worked as a self-employed architect in Florence (1983-1993). She was awarded a MA in Interior Design at Manchester Metropolitan University (1996) and a PhD by Published Works at the University of Derby (2015). She taught Interior Design at Leeds College of Art & Design, Leeds (2001-2007). She is a member of the Scientific Committee of the International Society of Biourbanism; Editor in Chief of the Journal of Biourbanism (2011-2014). She participated in international research projects, such as BEST Self-Build Processes, a Leonardo Lifelong learning project (2011-2013), Wor(l)ds which Exclude (2013-2014), Dance Architecture Spatiality (2012-2014). Her main research interests include architecture, human behaviours in urban spaces, architectural psychology and placemaking, ageing and vulnerable communities' needs in accommodation and urban design, and gender issues. Her outputs disseminate ideas of improvements for planning frameworks and specific social policies. She co-organised and also co-edited the Proceedings' book and the conference held at the University of Derby in collaboration with Architecture\_Media\_Politics\_Society (AMPS) in June 2017; title of the conference: 'Cities, Communities and Homes: Is the Urban Future Livable?' She is involved in intercollege research: Creative Aging cluster-Spaces and Places for carers and people with Dementia condition, planning and designing cities for people of any age with mental health issues, active participant in social justice research and regeneration of neighbourhoods at Derby and abroad. Currently involved in activities within the Nature Connectedness Research group at the University of Derby. For a number of years, she has been successfully supervising students at levels 7 and 8, and often shares research and authorship with them.
